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Take Care of Wounds. Wash your hands thoroughly with soap and clean water, if possible. Avoid touching the wound with your fingers while treating it (if possible, use disposable, latex gloves). Remove obstructive jewelry and clothing from the injured body part. Apply direct pressure to any bleeding wound to control bleeding.

Cleanse the wound periphery with soap and sterile water or available solutions, and provide anesthetics and analgesia whenever possible. Irrigate wounds with saline solution using a large bore needle and syringe. If unavailable, bottled water is acceptable. Leave contaminated wounds, bites, and punctures open.

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Wound closure is a key factor in healing and infection rate as well. Wounds left open will be infected to some extent. The six-hour rule for closure is followed for minor wounds; that is, if care is sought within those limits the wound can be cleaned and sutured with impunity.
